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

HUMANITY AND HUMOUR IN JESSE EISENBERG'S A REAL PAIN

A Real Pain follows David (Jesse Eisenberg) and Benji (Kieran Culkin) on a trip through Poland in honour of their late grandmother.

Winning the Waldo Salt Screenwriting Award at the Sundance Film Festival makes complete sense; whilst the film's run time only hits 90 minutes, it impressively manages to create a filmic world that feels both developed and extremely human.

As its director, co-star, writer, and producer, *A Real Pain* truly highlights Jesse Eisenberg's plethora of filmmaking talents without becoming a vanity project. He does not come across as someone flaunting his talent, but rather Kieran Culkin is given his well-deserved screen time.

With HBO's Succession having garnered massive popularity, Culkin has deservedly become recognised outside of his brother's fame. Being able to see him give life to a character outside of Roman Roy was an exciting prospect, there being a risk that Benji would not feel like a character who felt separate.

However, much like Eisenberg, despite the similarities that run through Culkin's ever-growing filmography, Benji still feels subtly different with more humanity alongside his quips and signature humour.

Although less renowned for one role in particular, Eisenberg also possesses a quality that seeps through into all his characters that makes them distinctively his but undeniably type-cast. With his role as David, it feels more introspective and self-aware than Eisenberg has been before.

What this film does particularly well is make the audience laugh out loud, while still maintaining moments of genuine human connection and poignancy.

Clearly drawing from personal experience; the house the characters visit being Eisenberg's actual family home until 1939, Eisenberg spoke to TheWrap about how he wrote A Real Pain from a place of wanting to explore his feelings of "privilege, guilt and self-hatred."

The film utilises the characters of David and Benji to explore generational pain, interfamily relations, and the intricacies of these when under an umbrella of larger global suffering.

Its relatively small cast makes for a closer connection to the audience and allows for the film to really develop its two main characters in a way that feels intimate and thought out. Culkin is very good at quick-fire dialogue and Eisenberg utilises this brilliantly throughout. He is witty and brings light to the film, whilst keeping the undertone of sorrow that is required to give this story well-earned intimate moments.

A Real Pain, which at its heart is about humanity, its flaws and strengths, benefits from a cinema viewing surrounded by others.

As Norma Desmond, she gives one of cinema's most iconic performances, in one of the great films about fame and Hollywood.




The Wrestler (35mm)

Robert Eggers' *Nosferatu* is already set to be unforgettable. Dropping on the very first day of 2025, it kicks off the new year perfectly with gorgeous cinematography and stunning costume design.

Crafted by Linda Muir, a long-time collaborator of Eggers, the costumes play a vital role in bringing the eerie, shadowy world of Count Orlok to life.

Reportedly having genuinely terrified cast mates, Bill Skarsgård's Count Orlok returns to Bram Stoker's original vision of a chilling and otherworldly demon. Although we have yet to see Skarsgård's transformation, having only been shown through shadowy forms in the lead up to its release, the styling of castmates have set expectations high.

With male supporting characters, Nicholas Hoult as Thomas Hutter and Willem Dafoe as Professor Albin Eberhart Von Franz, dressed in thick textured, layered, and well tailored suits, each outfit works to immerse us in Eggers' haunting reimagining of a timeless classic

Set against a dark, mysterious, and tense backdrop, the costumes not only needed to representative of its 1838 period but also be visible in the film's lowlight environments. To successfully achieve this, Muir relied on pale colours, reflective fabrics, and ensured polished jewellery caught the glimmers of light regardless of their material or chunkiness.

This careful attention to detail ensures that the characters stand out, even in the film's darkest moments. Here at the Tyneside, we can't wait to catch the highly anticipated release in full detail thanks to our 35mm print screenings.
